

16-19 Bursary Fund Policy

1 Policy Statement

- 1.1 The 16-19 Bursary Fund is made available from the government through the Department for Education (DfE), to provide assistance to 16-19 year old students whose access to, or completion of, education is inhibited by financial constraints or barriers.
- 1.2 This policy outlines the manner in which the 16-19 Bursary Fund will be managed and adheres to the DfE 16 to 19 Bursary Fund guide: 2026 to 2027 and, where relevant, the DfE Free meals in further education funded institutions guide: academic year 2026 to 2027
- 1.3 References to the Trust or Academy within this policy specifically include all nursery, primary, secondary and special academies within the Trust, as well as Priory Apprenticeships and Lincolnshire ITT.
- 1.4 This policy does not form part of any employee's contract of employment and it may be amended at any time.

2 Roles, Responsibilities and Implementation

- 2.1 The Finance Committee has overall responsibility for the effective operation of this policy and for ensuring compliance with the relevant statutory framework. This committee delegates day-to-day responsibility for operating the policy and ensuring its maintenance and review to the Chief Financial Officer.
- 2.2 This policy is approved by the Finance Committee before being ratified at the next available Trust Board meeting. Approval and ratification is minuted, with records kept by the Clerk to Trustees.
- 2.3 Leaders and Managers have a specific responsibility to ensure the fair application of this policy and all staff are responsible for supporting colleagues and ensuring its success.

3 Aims

- 3.1 To provide financial support to help students overcome the specific financial barriers to participation they face so they can remain in education.

4 Funding Outline

- 4.1 Support is available in the following forms –
 - Vulnerable Bursary
 - Discretionary Bursary

- Free Meals in Further Education
- Laptop Loan

4.2 A vulnerable bursary may be available for students who meet the following criteria:

- is a young person in care;
- is a young care leaver (previously in care or foster care);
- is in receipt of Income Support or Universal Credit in their own right and are financially supporting themselves and anyone who is dependent upon and living with them;
- is in receipt of Disability Living Allowance or Personal Independence Payments in their own right **as well as** Employment and Support Allowance or Universal Credit in their own right;
- if successful, payment frequency and amounts are evaluated based on individual students' needs. These may be either in a single payment, monthly payments or a mix of both;
- students will need to submit a breakdown of funding requirements in order to establish the amount of funding needed;
- the bursary will only be paid if the student has attendance of 85% and above, unless authorisation is given by a relevant member of staff; and
- each student will receive written confirmation whether or not their application has been successful, along with a breakdown of payments they will receive and when.

Meeting the above criteria for the Vulnerable Bursary does not automatically mean funding will be awarded. Only students with an actual financial need may be awarded funding support. The Trust may decide that although a young person may be eligible for a bursary because they are in one or more of the defined vulnerable groups, they do not have any actual financial need. This might be because their financial needs are already met and/or because they have no relevant costs. The Trust can refuse a student's application on this basis. Similarly, students will only receive the amount they actually need to participate.

4.3 The discretionary bursary is for students who need financial help but do not qualify for a bursary for students in vulnerable groups.
To qualify for the discretionary bursary your total household income per year must be no more than:

- £33,846.00 for single child households;
- £35,538.30 for households with two children (still receiving child benefit);



- £37,315.22 for households with three children (still receiving child benefit); or
 - £39,180.98 for households with four or more children (still receiving child benefit).
- Payment frequency and amounts are evaluated based on individual students' needs. These may be either in a single payment, monthly payments or a mix of both.
 - Each student will receive written confirmation whether or not their application has been successful, along with a breakdown of payments they will receive and when.
 - The bursary will only be paid if the student has attendance of 85% and above, unless authorisation is given by a relevant member of staff.

4.4 Free Meals in Further Education

Eligible sixth form students may receive a free meal on each day they attend their study programme, where appropriate. Free meals are separate from 16-19 bursary awards and have their own eligibility criteria. From academic year 2026 to 2027, students may be eligible where they, or their parent/carer or responsible adult, are in receipt of one or more of the following:

- Universal Credit;
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance;
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999;
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit; or
- Meet relevant no recourse to public funds criteria, where applicable.

4.5 Laptop Loan

Loan of a Bursary laptop is available to any sixth form student who does not have access to computer equipment at home. There are no additional criteria required in such cases. Please contact your Head of Sixth Form to make an application.

5 Eligibility

5.1 Age

- 5.1.a Students must meet the age and residency criteria which follow to be eligible for help from the bursary fund.
- 5.1.b A student must be aged 16 or over but under 19 at 31 August 2026 to be eligible for help from the bursary fund in the 2026 to 2027 academic year.

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- 5.1.c Students aged 19 or over are only eligible to receive a discretionary bursary if they are continuing on a study programme they began aged 16 to 18 ('19+ continuers') or have an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP).
- 5.1.d These 2 groups of aged 19+ students can receive a discretionary bursary while they continue to attend education (in the case of a 19+ continuer, this must be the same programme they started before they turned 19), as long as their eligibility continues and the Trust considers they need the support to continue their participation.
- 5.1.e Students aged 19 or over are not eligible for bursaries for vulnerable groups.
- 5.1.f The trust will only pay bursaries to students aged 16 or over. However, in exceptional circumstances institutions may use their discretion to pay bursaries to younger students, for example, where a student is following an accelerated study programme.
- 5.1.g Students aged under 19 enrolled on higher education qualifications are not eligible for support.

5.2 Eligible Education Provision

- 5.2.a Students must be participating in provision that is subject to inspection by a public body that assures quality (for example Ofsted). The provision must also be either:
- a 16 to 19 traineeship programme;
 - funded directly by DfE or by the DfE via a local authority;
 - funded or co-financed by the European Social Fund; or
 - otherwise publicly funded and lead to a qualification (up to and including level 3) accredited by Ofqual or on the DfE list of qualifications approved for funding 14 to 19.
- 5.2.b Students on apprenticeship programmes, or any waged training, are employed, rather than in education. They are not eligible for the 16 to 19 Bursary Fund.
- 5.2.c Non-employed students aged 16 to 19 who are participating in a Prince's Trust Team Programme are eligible to receive the bursary in the same way as any other student participating in an eligible, publicly funded course.
- 5.2.d The Trust does not expect students on distance learning provision to need help from the bursary fund because they do not have the kinds of costs the bursary is intended to cover (travel, equipment and uniforms, for example). In the rare instances where the Trust identifies such a student does require financial help,

they should provide support in-kind. An example could be providing a temporary travel pass for the student to attend exams.

5.3 Residency - Students must meet the residency criteria in DfE funding regulations for post-16 provision. In line with these regulations the trust may be required to request evidence to support this.

5.4 Eligibility criteria: bursaries for young people in defined vulnerable groups
Students who meet the criteria, and who have a financial need, can apply for a bursary for vulnerable groups. The defined groups reflect that these students are unlikely to be receiving financial assistance from parents or carers, so may need a greater level of support to enable them to continue to participate. Students will be awarded the amount of support they need to participate based on an assessment of the types of costs they have. The Trust will ensure students are eligible for the bursary for defined vulnerable groups in each year they require support.

The defined vulnerable groups are students who are:

- in care;
- care leavers;
- receiving Income Support, or Universal Credit because they are financially supporting themselves or financially supporting themselves and someone who is dependent on them and living with them such as a child or partner; and/or
- receiving Disability Living Allowance or Personal Independence Payments in their own right **as well as** Employment and Support Allowance or Universal Credit in their own right.

5.5 The Trust may decide that although a young person may be eligible for a bursary because they are in one or more of the defined vulnerable groups, they do not have any actual financial need. This might be because their financial needs are already met and/or because they have no relevant costs. The Trust can refuse a student's application on this basis. Similarly, students will only receive the amount they actually need to participate.

5.6 Further criteria by which bursary funds will be made available is explained in Section 4. In order to apply, you must be able to provide evidence of the household income. The student must also have their own bank account into which the money can be transferred, and the bursary will only be paid if the student has over 85% attendance, unless authorised by a member of staff.

6 Applications and Payment Process

6.1 Students should apply for a bursary by Friday 18th September 2026. Applications may be received after this date but in this case, payments may be

awarded on a pro-rata basis (unless receipts can be provided of expenditure already incurred) if the September deadline is missed. Students must only apply for funds which are essential to their individual study programme. Applications, which are incomplete or are missing evidence will be classed as late submissions. Once the applications are complete, from this date they will be reviewed and also may be awarded on a pro-rata basis (unless receipts can be provided of expenditure already incurred).

- 6.2 All applications must be submitted via the Applicaa Bursary16+ platform. Students can access this through the Applications+ platform using their existing login details. Students who do not use the Applications+ platform will need to register with Applicaa Bursary16+ via the link on the academy website using their Priory email address.
- 6.3 The Finance Department will check each application to assess whether all criteria is met. Exceptions may be made under exceptional circumstances and will be taken into account on each individual application.
- 6.4 Students will be informed in writing of the decisions of the Finance Department.
- 6.5 Any bursary funding paid directly to the student must be spent as per the funding requirements submitted on their application. Funds must be used for essential costs of participating in their study programme only. E.g., transport costs, uniform, work materials and equipment etc.
- 6.6 Bursary payments are transferred directly into student's bank accounts. Payments should not be made into another person's account, except in exceptional circumstances where a student is unable to administer their own account. Payments may be made to a joint account, as long as the student is one of the account holders
- 6.7 Bursaries may also be paid 'in kind'. Such items will be provided to the named individual. In the case of books or equipment we ask they be returned at the end of the course.
- 6.8 In determining payments of the 16-19 Bursary Fund students will not be discriminated against on the basis of their protected characteristics. Payments are also subject to the public sector equality duty in section 149(1) of the Equality Act.

7 Funding

- 7.1 Transport – Students can request to apply for a Post-16 Travel Pass from Lincolnshire County Council where if the student meets Lincolnshire County Councils eligibility criteria, the Bursary Fund will cover this cost. Either the

school can arrange to pay this directly with the School Transport Team, or the student will be reimbursed on provision of receipts. Please see www.lincolnshire.gov.uk/roads-transport/apply-post-16-transport for further information.

- 7.2 Other Transport Cost – Students who require funding support for transport costs other than the Post-16 Travel Pass must live more than 1.5 miles from their school.
- 7.3 Uniform & Specialist Uniform – Uniform to meet the school’s standard dress code may be funded up to a maximum of £200.00. This is to include all uniform i.e., suit or equivalent, shoes, shirts, bag etc. Any specialist uniform required for a specific course, which costs more than £200.00, may be funded however, this will be assessed on each individual case.
- 7.4 Laptops are available for loan to students who do not have access to IT equipment at home to support their studies. Please contact the Head of Year to apply.
- 7.5 Funding for general stationery (including calculators, notepads, revision cards etc.) is capped to a maximum of £50.00, however actual funding need will be assessed on each individual case.
- 7.6 What the bursary fund cannot be used for:
- provide learning support – services that institutions give to students. Examples include counselling, mentoring, extra tutoring, or support such as servicing laptops/tablets;
 - support extra-curricular activities where these are not essential to the students’ study programme;
 - support the costs of foreign/overseas field trips where the content can be found within England at a much cheaper cost and/or to support the costs of fields trips that are not a compulsory part of the student’s curriculum; and/or
 - payments to support students’ general living costs.
- 7.7 All funding requests will be reviewed by a member of the student’s academy as well as a member of the finance team.

8 Policy Change

- 8.1 This policy may only be amended or withdrawn by the Priory Federation of Academies Trust.
